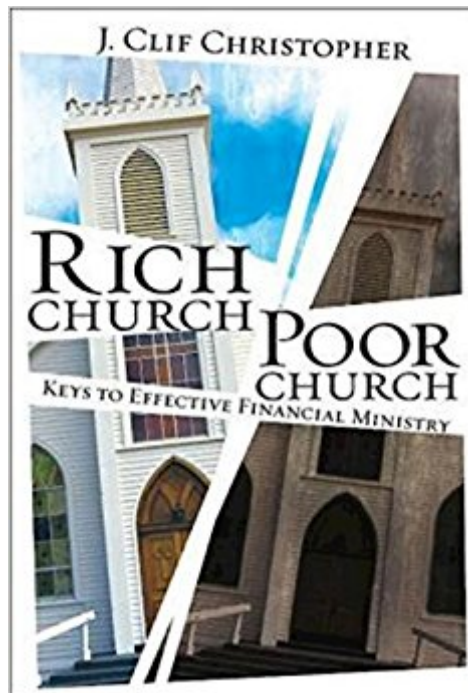

I have read several of the author's previous books that focus more specifically on stewardship (congregational giving). This is his most recent and best book. It includes stewardship but is more broadly focused on how to be a healthy congregation. The title could easily be "Healthy Church, Unhealthy Church." We found it to be very helpful and as a result have decided on several new approaches and modifications to our ministry in the coming year and beyond. It is well written with stimulating discussion question at the end of each chapter. The underlying theme is not so much a how to as it is a how to be in the world of church finances. A must read for all those involved in church leadership. On a personal note, I greatly appreciated Clif's willingness to be vulnerable and disclose where he had not necessarily been a good steward. I have bought a few cars myself. Read this book and it will change your church for the future. Healthy spiritual communities is everyone's responsibility.
