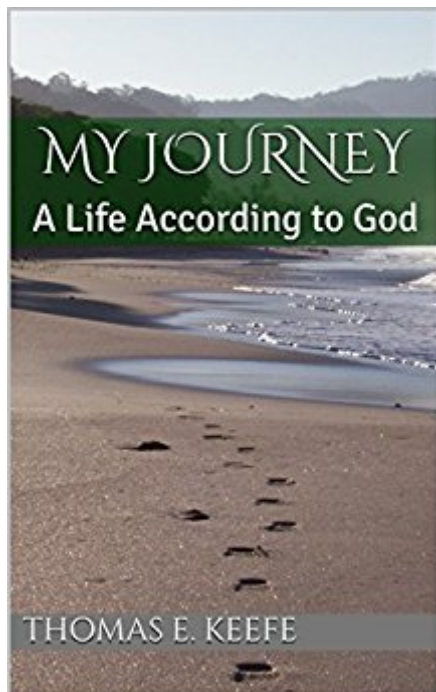


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My Journey: A Life According To God

First I want to say that when a book has humor, you already have me. That is, if it's truly humor. And this writer uses humor skillfully, yet effortlessly. It's just there. I can sense his emotions, which is what any writer wants his reader to be able to do. So that is a great start for me

in any book. Because of my own journey in and out of religion, I got him often in the book. I really liked when God addressed the whole Jesus thing, especially the parts about him poking fun at how things really went down in the New Testament and the history being pointed out in a laughable manner. The author truly knows stuff, but continues to write in parody-style, maybe to not offend some, by keeping it light. I'm not sure, but that's how it came across to me. He's truly getting at some nitty-gritty stuff, but continues to keep it light throughout, because of the consistent humor infiltrating almost every sentence, and without being redundant. The explanation of low and high Christology was great. I've always wanted to say that, but never did. I wish I had. A book that speaks from the first person as God can be risky. To make the assumption that one can know the mind of God is always considered disrespectful, to say the least. To put words into God's mouth (Proverbs 30:5-6) is also taking a chance. But overall, if you read this without a spirit of criticism, it almost provides a relief from the solemnness that religion seems to provide. There are so many little hidden nuggets within this very short story. I could read it again and again for two reasons: It takes little time to read through it and you hear something different each time. One small example is when he says we are sadly, still in the age of Pisces. And when he just goes off into modern-day references - it keeps things interesting. I recommend this book for people who pretty much know what they believe, but don't take themselves too seriously. If you're still trying to figure out what you believe, or you are so dogmatic that you can't be bothered with others' beliefs or the humor in it all, then you probably wouldn't enjoy this book.

This book is delightfully witty and mildly irreverent (in the best sense). I laughed the whole way through. Keefe's courage to narrate from the point of view of God pays off both in humor and innovative theological reflection. This book will especially delight those who have studied theology or religious history, as the inside jokes are expertly presented.

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Don't be fooled by its small size and playful tone - **My Journey** tackles a host of thorny theological issues - from ontology to Christology - all within a warm-hearted "coming-of-age" tale that incorporates and embraces other cultures and faith traditions. Clearly well versed in history and philosophy in addition to the Judeo-Christian tradition, the author combines the irreverent humor of Christopher Moore's **Lamb** or Joseph Heller's **God Knows** with the rapid-fire scholarly references of Umberto Eco's **Foucault's Pendulum**.
